Europe's favourite cities to live in!**We explore four cities which score highly on the list of best places to live in Europe****Skopje, North Macedonia**

About a quarter of North Macedonia's population lives in Skopje, which has seen big changes since 1963 when an earthquake destroyed about 80% of the city. Since then, they have rebuilt important parts of the city, including the National Theatre, government buildings and bridges.

One main attraction in Skopje is its Old Bazaar, one of the largest and oldest markets in the region. It's not just a place to do your shopping: you can also find the Museum of Modern Art there. People who live in Skopje like the fact that it's quite a cheap place to live, and summer lasts for six months!

Warsaw, Poland

The Vistula River divides Poland's capital in two, and the two halves are quite different. In general, you see a lot of smart buildings and clothes on the west bank while the east bank is popular with artists.

After World War II, 90% of the city was destroyed, but they have rebuilt much of it. The charming Old Town is still stunning with its historic square and the colourful buildings all around it.

Over the years, Warsaw has become more attractive to young people, with its beaches along the river, various cultural events, modern skyscrapers and busy cafés.

Budapest, Hungary

Budapest is really two cities, Buda and Pest, on either side of the famous River Danube. It's a great city for tourists with a wide variety of public transport including bus, train, tram and boat. There are plenty of things to see and do there. You can spend the day at Buda Castle on Castle Hill or at the impressive old public baths where the locals play chess in the outdoor pools. The covered market has hundreds of varieties of cold meats and spices to choose from. And the old-fashioned cafés in Pest, selling hot chocolate and delicious cakes, make it a popular place for tourists. Hungarians love bread and, like most Hungarian cities, Budapest is full of wonderful bread shops.

Ljubljana, Slovenia

Ljubljana is the tiny capital of Slovenia. Just 300,000 people live there. Forty thousand of these are students, which makes the city a very lively place. The old town is small enough to explore on foot. You can also relax in one of the many cafés by the lovely river which runs through the middle of the town.

A pretty bridge crosses the river, while an ancient castle sits on a hill above the city. There's also Tivoli Park which is a wonderful, peaceful place to go hiking. Clean, green and bicycle-friendly, it's easy to imagine why people like living here.
