2. Julie would like to buy a new outfit for her friend's party. She has \$48 and the outfit she wants is \$58. Can she save or spend her money?
3. Ms. Smith's second grade class wants to go on a field trip. They need \$350. They have \$419 from a bake sale. Should they spend or save their money?
4. Juan's going to a birthday party on Friday for his friend. He has \$12 and has not bought his friend a gift. Does he need to save or spend his money?
5. Katie wants a puppy that costs \$300 but she only has \$215. Should she be saving or spending her money?
6. Cameron has his own apartment and needs to buy a vacuum cleaner. His mother told him to keep his new place clean. He only has \$37 in his bank account. Should he spend or save his money?
7. John wants to buy a book that costs \$14. He has \$12. What should he do with his money?

4. Mr. Adams is budgeting his money so that he can take his family on a vacation to the beach next month.
5. There is a sale at the local food market on all green vegetables. Eduardo is going to buy some to make a breakfast for his friends.
6. Gwendolyn is making an online payment for her electric bill.
