SPECIAL CASES: NEED

1. Need as a common verb

You to speak to them
..... to call more volunteers?

2. Need as a modal verb

You speak to them
.....they call more volunteers?
Yes, they..... / No, we

3. **Need + V-ing (something needs fixing or improving)**

This pipe needs fixing
Your shirt needs cleaning

4. **Need have** Used to talk about things which were done but were unnecessary

Didn't have to Used to talk about things which were unnecessary and we probably didn't do

Look and find the difference:

She needn't have got up early. The meeting had been cancelled
She didn't have to get up early. The meeting had been cancelled

⚠️ SPECIAL CASES: OUGHT TO

Affirmative: You ought to leave with us

Negative: You to go

MODAL PERFECT (modal + have + past participle)

Used for past situations

You should gone with them

His things are not here. He have left
