

# Adjectives Ending in -ing or -ed

## Adjectives ending in -ing:

Adjectives ending in -ing have an active meaning. They describe what someone or something causes.

For example:

- driving hazards
- an embarrassing situation
- an interesting person

## Adjectives ending in -ed:

Adjectives ending in -ed have a passive meaning. They describe the effect on a person or a thing and often what a person feels. For example:

- populated areas
- a confused child
- an amused audience
