

Commas, Semicolons and Colons

Commas are used to separate items in a series.

Example:

I want chocolate, soda, and chips.

Semicolons are used to separate categories in a series that already has commas.

Example:

I went to the beach with Dan, my brother's friend; Lola, my sister; and Sam, my best friend.

Semicolons are also used to separate two related independent clauses that are connected without a conjunction, such as *and*, *or*, *but*, *so*, *because*, etc.

Example:

I have cleaned my bedroom but I still need to wash the dishes.

I have cleaned my bedroom; I still need to wash the dishes.

Colons are used after an independent clause to introduce a list.

Example:

I want to plant three vegetables: radishes, tomatoes, and squash.
