Second Conditional

Revise the rule: We use the **second conditional** when talking about <u>future events</u> that are NOT likely to happen. This is known as an unreal conditional.

If + Simple Past + Would + Verb Would + Verb + If + Simple Past

- If a tiger walked into the room, I would scream
- · I would scream if a tiger walked into the room.
