In *The Book of Negroes*, Hill's main protagonist, Aminata Diallo, is an African woman (5) _____ story is based on this history and her endeavours to get her name into the British naval officers' book. When Aminata, the daughter of a jeweller and a midwife, is only eleven years old, she, along with a handful of her fellow villagers, is kidnapped from her village - Bayo, Niger in West Africa - and forced to walk for three
