RULE

If the 1st verb started **LATER** than the 2nd verb: 2nd verb = [verb+ing].

If the 1st verb started **BEFORE** the 2nd verb: 2nd verb = [infinitive]

If the 1st and 2nd verb **happen at the same time**: 2nd = [verb+ing]
