Dialogue and Punctuation

Rules:

- Quotation marks go around all spoken words (also called dialogue).
 Example: "I want to visit Australia. Also, I plan to travel to France," said Anna.
- The first word spoken is capitalized. Example: The student exclaimed, "We love making slime!"
- Punctuation marks at the end of the dialogue go inside the quotation marks.
 Example: "Let's play soccer!" yelled Luis.
- 4. A comma is used to separate the spoken words from the dialogue tag (the person who is speaking).
 Example: "Please put your books away," said the teacher. She then explained, "It's time for lunch."
