## Connectives

A **connective** is a word or phrase that links clauses within a sentence or links sentences within a text. There are different types of connectives: **subordinate conjunctions** (see page 22) and **connecting adverbs**, such as **however**, **then** and **therefore**.

## Connecting adverbs

Connecting adverbs help to bring a whole text together, and help it to flow smoothly.

They do this in several different ways:

- By explaining a point, as in: for instance, for example and in other words
   For example, 'I eat a lot of chocolate. For instance, I can eat a whole bar of chocolate before breakfast!'
- By adding a point or making a point stronger, as in: also, furthermore, in
  particular, besides, anyway, after all and apart from. For example, 'I eat a lot of
  chocolate. After all, they say that chocolate is good for you!'
- By showing cause and effect, as in: therefore, consequently and as a result. For example, 'I do a lot of exercise. Consequently, I am fit and healthy.'
- By showing time, as in: after, as soon as, while, afterwards, meanwhile, eventually, just then, later and finally. For example, 'I ran a marathon at the weekend. Afterwards, I was exhausted – but very happy!'
- By ordering a list, as in: firstly, first of all, secondly, next, after and finally. For example: 'First of all, dig the holes. Next, plant the seeds and, after that, refill the holes with soil. Finally, water the seeds regularly and wait for them to grow into plants.'
- By comparing ideas that are similar, as in: as with, equally, like and similarly.
   For example, 'I love going swimming. Equally, I love playing in the park!'
- By showing opposite ideas, as in: alternatively, however, instead of, nevertheless, on the other hand, otherwise, unlike and whereas.
   For example, 'I love going swimming. However, I don't like cycling.'

## Take note!

Usually, commas are used after connecting adverbs. However, a comma is not needed after after, as soon as, while, as with, like, instead of, unlike and whereas.
