Comparatives and Superlatives

Comparatives compare 2 of something. Example: Tracy talks louder than Tony.

Superlatives compare 3 or more of something. Example: Terry talks loudest of all.

Short comparatives (1 or 2 syllables), add -er to the word. Example: This one is longer than that one.

Short superlatives (1 or 2 syllables), add -est to the word. Example: That one is the longest of all.

Comparatives that end in -ly, add more before the word. Example: She sang more sweetly than Sue.

Superlatives that end in -ly, add most before the word. Example: Linda sang most sweetly of all.

Words ending in -y, change -y to -i and add the -er or -est. Example: early = earlier = earliest.


Special cases: for good or well, use good/well = better = best. For bad, use bad = worse = worst.
