Past simple	Present perfect
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>No connection to the present (Nincs kapcsolat a jelennel) <i>He <b>washed</b> his car but now it's dirty again.</i></li> <li>Sometime in the past (valamikor a múltban történt) <i>I <b>read</b> two books last year.</i> It can't be changed (he isn't alive) (már nem él – nem változhat már) <i>Shakespeare <b>wrote</b> Romeo and Juliet</i></li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Connection to the present: (Van kapcsolat a jelennel) <i>He <b>'s washed</b> his car. Look, it's so clean!</i></li> <li>Until now: (Mostanáig történt) <i>There are 5 books on my list but I've <b>read</b> only 2.</i></li> <li>It can be changed ( még él – tehát még változhat) <i>Varró Dani <b>has written</b> so many nice poems.</i></li> </ul>

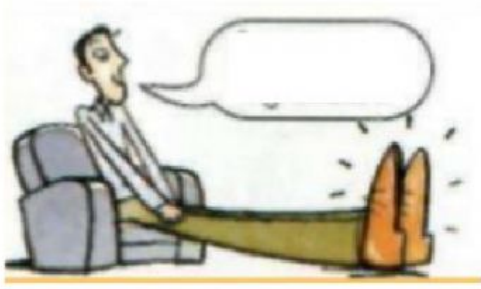

Messi **scored** / **has scored** thousands of goals.



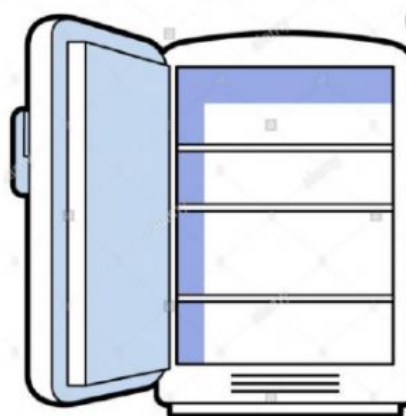
I **bought / have bought** these shoes.
