



Quantifiers

★ Enough

- a) After adjectives and adverbs.

Example: The bananas weren't ripe **enough**.

- b) Before nouns as determiners.

Example: He hasn't got **enough** time.

- c) It may be used alone as a pronoun.

Example: Would you like some wine?

No, thanks. I have **enough**.



★ Too many

Is always followed by an countable plural noun.

Example: I've eaten **too many** chocolates.



★ Too

Is used before adjectives or adverbs.

Examples: My jeans are **too** old.

He drives **too** fast.

It may be followed by an infinitive with to.

Example: The weather was **too** cold (for me) to swim.



★ Too much

Is always followed by an uncountable noun.

Example: He eats **too much** sugar.
