shopping centres

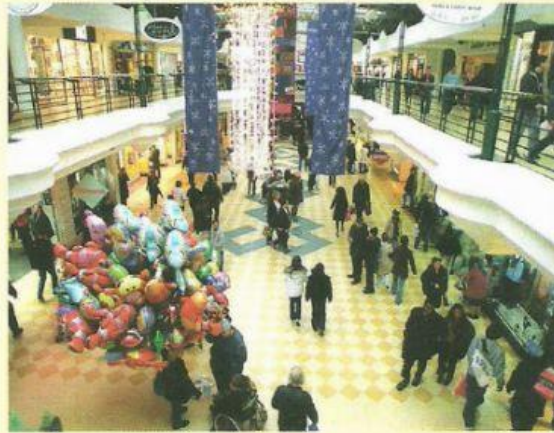
