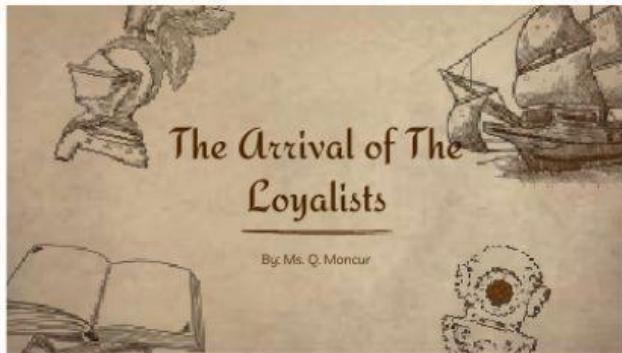
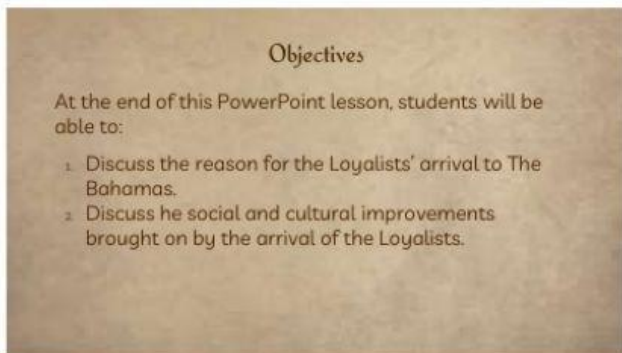
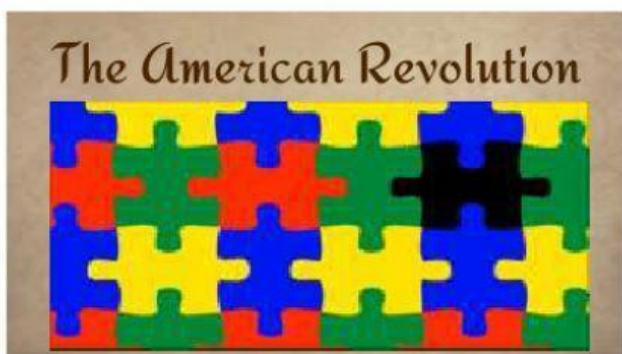








The Loyalists lived in the southern states in America. They were called Loyalists because they were loyal to England, and did not want to be independent.





George Washington at the White House, and other military officials around the Battery in New York in 1783. (Howard Chandler Christy)

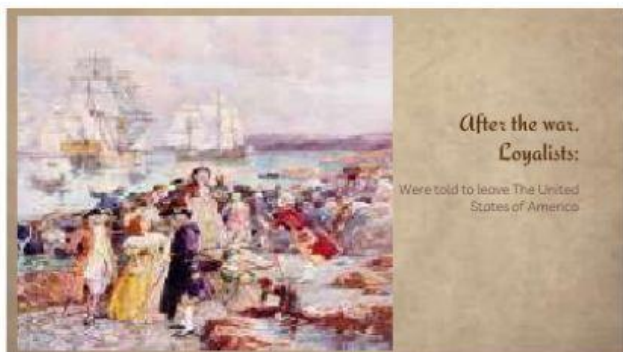
After the war,

After the war, Loyalists:

Eventually, the cotton plantations failed because:

- Of poor management.
- The soils were worn-out.
- Bugs (the chenille and red bugs) attacked, and destroyed the cotton trees.

The main occupation of Loyalists living on Abaco was ship building.

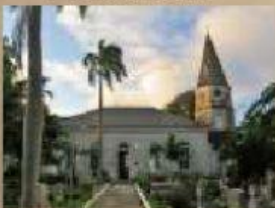


John Wells started the first newspaper called *The Bahama Gazette*.

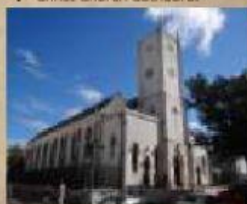


Two churches built by the Loyalists on New Providence Island were:

• St. Matthew's Church

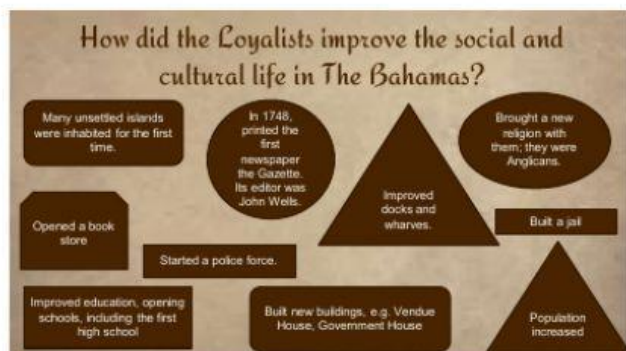


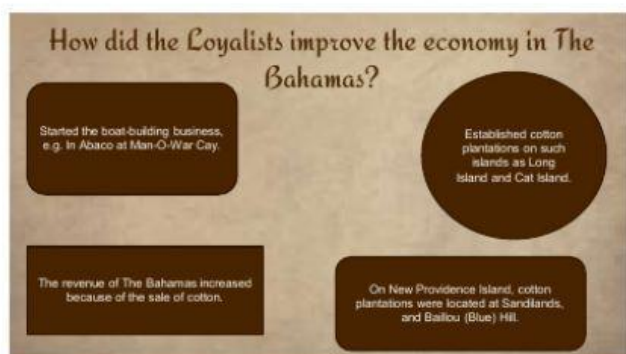

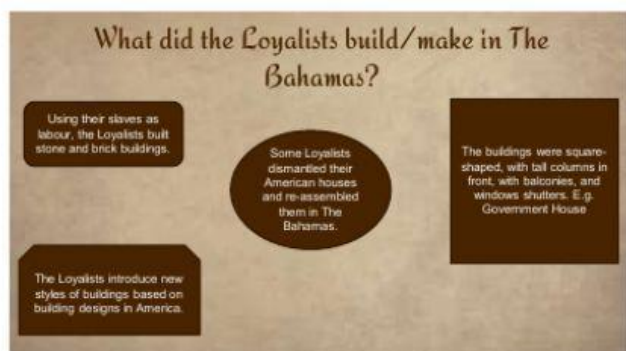


The Loyalists increased the population of The Bahamas by bringing their slaves with them.
