1. Gender stereotypes are a product of ignorance

A review of the prominent late 19th-century biological writings reveals that a major plank of early evolution theory was the belief that women were intellectually and physically inferior to men. Female inferiority was a logical conclusion of the Darwinian world view because males were believed to be exposed to far greater selective pressures than females, especially in war, competition for mates, food and clothing. Conversely, women were protected from selection by norms that required adult males provide for and protect women and children. Darwinists taught that as a result of this protection, natural selection operated far more actively on males than on females, producing male superiority in virtually all intellectual and skill areas. As a result, males became "more evolved" than women.

Competitiveness, goal-orientated, independence protectiveness etc.

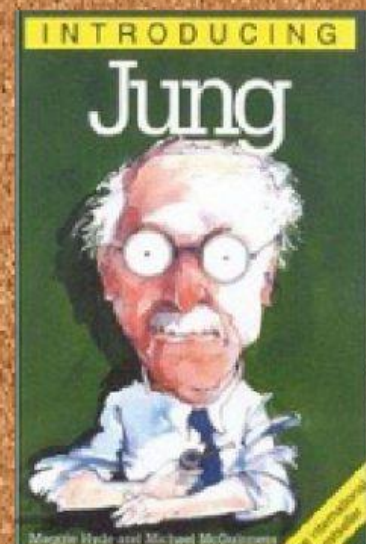
However, successful business leaders embody both masculine and feminine traits.

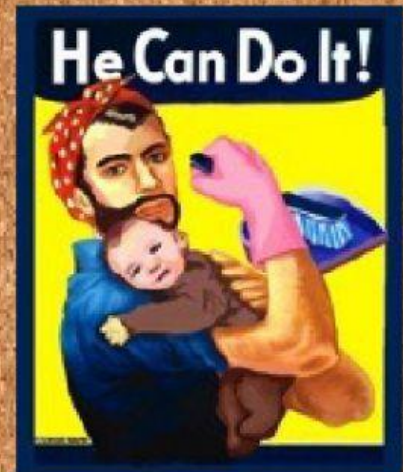
2. Society has little understanding of gender

Unfortunately, corporate America often conflates confidence with competence because, as the [Harvard Business Review](#) notes, people generally confuse displays of confidence as shows of competence. Humility, on the other hand, allows a leader's humanity to peek through, and that inspires people to follow.

Even Jim Collins, the well-known author of the famed business book *Good to Great*, notes two common traits among successful CEOs: humility and sheer determination

Take this 2015 [study](#) of 105 computer hardware and software firms published in the *Journal of Management*. It shows that humility in CEOs leads to better performance and increased flexibility, cooperation, and collaboration in developing strategies.

Both men and women can embody feminine and masculine traits. School creates an environment where both boys and girls can learn from one another.

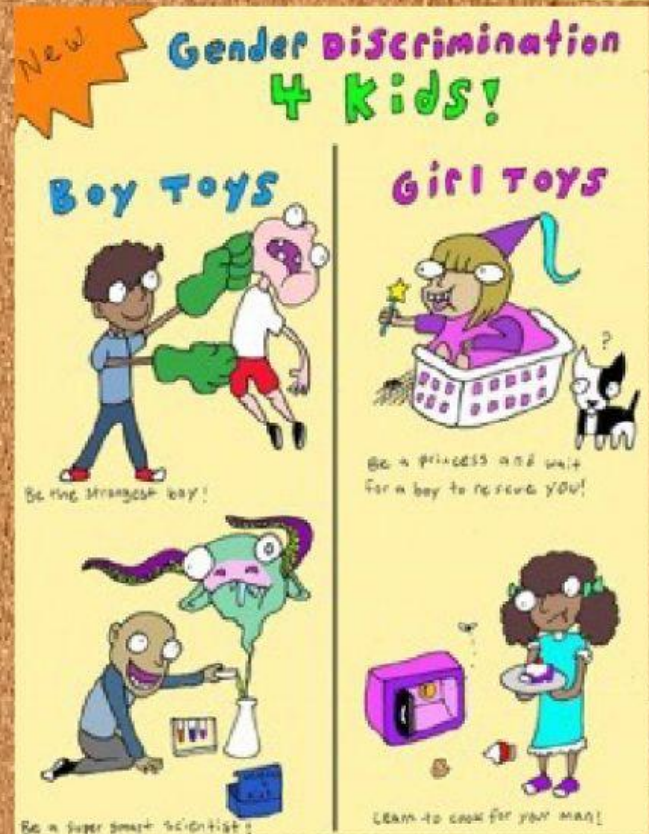
Women are programmed to feel mentally and physically weak. A lot of female orientated games like doll play, cooking, don't teach entrepreneurial skills. They are designed to teach women to play a supportive role rather than being a leader.

Many of the toys that toy makers typically assign to girls point them in a certain direction, often associated with homemaking and pleasing men, a point recently made by comic artist Christine Deneweth, who published a fantastic cartoon about kids and gender discrimination (see right).

Deneweth says she was watching TV when she saw toy commercials featuring boys conquering the world while girls stayed at home. She realized that the toys weren't just gendered, they were limiting girls to few roles in society.

"Boy toys market that boys can be anything: scientists, dragon masters, sports stars, superheroes, and so much more," she said. "Girl toys limit girls into being moms and cooks. And while it is good to be a mom or a cook, toy marketing doesn't show girls in a variety of roles. This can be damaging because girls need to see that they can do anything, too." This is why GENDER NEUTRAL education is important. Instead of boxing girls and boys into outdated gender stereotypes, we give them an opportunity to learn and respect one another!
