Meeting Michelle Obama

Before she came, there was such a buzz. I was in the main school hall (0) ___ 300 other students. Everyone was quiet, everyone eagerly awaiting her arrival. When she walked on to the stage, we jumped to our feet – clapping, shouting, crying. She brought this incredible vibe and the atmosphere was just electric.
