

# PRESENT PERFECT: Have you...?

## PAST EXPERIENCES

We don't say when these events happened

- ✓ *I have been to Tokyo.*
- ✗ *He hasn't been to Japan.*
- ✓ *She has done traditional dancing.*
- ✗ *We have never done origami.*
- ✗ *We haven't (ever) created an animation.*
- ? *Have you (ever) performed a play?*



## basic structure

- ✓ Subject + have/has + past participle
- ✗ Subject + haven't/hasn't + past participle
- ? Have/Has + subject + past participle?



## short answer

- ✓ Yes, + subject + have/has
- ✗ No, + subject + haven't/hasn't



+ never

+ ever

- ✗ Subj. + have/has + never + past participle
- ✗ Subj. + haven't/hasn't + ever + past part.
- ? Have/Has + subj. + ever + past participle?
