TIP 1

AVOID USING INFORMAL LANGUAGE.

GREETINGS	
FORMAL	INFORMAL
Good morning/afternoon/evening/day. How do you do? Pleased to meet you. How are you doing? It's a pleasure to be here. Looking forward to hearing from you soon. Thank you very much.	Hi Hiya How's it going? How you doing? Alright! 'Sup Yo How's things/how's life? See ya See ya Later

TIP 2

USE A WIDE VARIETY OF DISCOURSE MARKERS.

USEFUL DISCOURSE MARKERS
