Escape down the river of fire

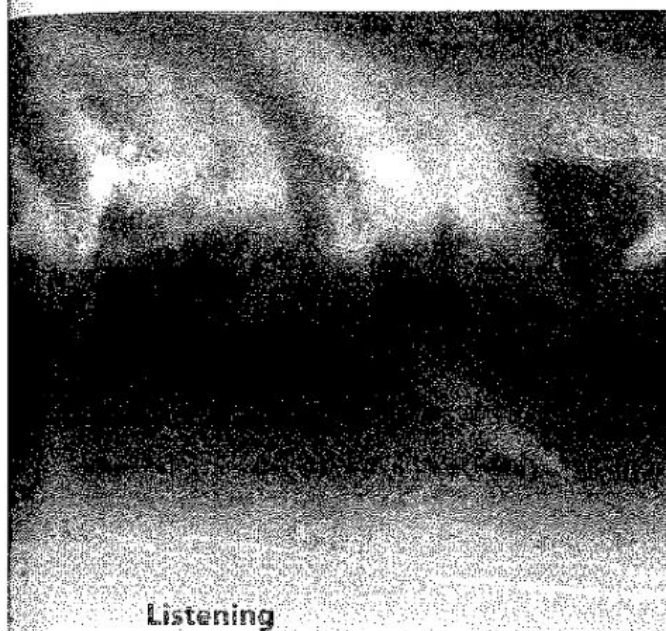
Kyle Haynam, 16, and Scotty Craighead, 11, were on a rafting trip with five other children and twenty-three adults. When they reached camp in the afternoon, they could see flames on the other side of the river. The flames were as high as a three-storey building. The fire was still two miles away, so nobody was worried. Then, suddenly, the wind changed direction and the fire was pushed closer. Everyone was surprised but nobody was frightened. After all, a fire couldn't jump the river... or could it?

That evening, the wind changed again and burning vegetation was thrown across the river. Kyle and his group were suddenly surrounded by a forest fire. They were trapped! There was only one way to escape. They had to keep rowing to the next campsite. It was very hot and the thick smoke hurt their eyes, so they put wet towels over their faces. When they reached the next campsite, they found it was burned to the ground. The fire on the campsite was out, so it was safe to stay there. However, the mountain above was still on fire and thick smoke filled the air. That night, they slept with wet towels over their faces. It was difficult to breathe through the smoke, but it was also difficult to breathe through the towel, Kyle says.

When they woke early the next morning, it was very cold. The sun was covered by the ash and they couldn't even see the river through the thick smoke. Kyle and his friends were scared. The fire was getting nearer and nearer. 'We were rowing hard and fast because we didn't want to be in the smoke another day,' says Scotty.
