

Gerunds after prepositions

Reading: A,B,C, or D?

Do you get excited about having new challenges? Are you fond of competing in games or competitions? Do you complain about having to wait in lines? Are you easily bored with doing routine activities? Then, you are probably a Type A personality.

Do you look forward to going to parties or other social events? Are you good at telling stories or jokes? Are you interested in having a career that involves working with lots of different people? Then you may be a Type B.



Do you care about having all the facts and insist on getting the details right? Do you like to be responsible for organizing information or events? Do you worry about making mistakes? You are probably a Type C.

Finally, do you feel happy about doing repetitive activities? Are you capable of following instructions and sticking to routines? Do you object to making changes in the way you do things? Those are traits of the Type D personality.

Of course, the truth is that most people are a combination of two or more personality types, but we may have more traits of one type than of all the other.

Grammar

The gerund looks like a verb, but it actually acts as a noun.

Gerund as a verb: I go swimming in the summer.

Gerund as a noun: Swimming is my favorite sport.

Prepositions

Prepositions are short words (on, in, to) that usually stand in front of nouns (sometimes also in front of gerund verbs).

Even advanced learners of English find prepositions difficult, as a 1:1 translation is usually not possible. One preposition in your native language might have several translations depending on the situation.

There are hardly any rules as to when to use which preposition. The only way to learn prepositions is looking them up in a dictionary, reading a lot in English and learning useful phrases off by heart.
