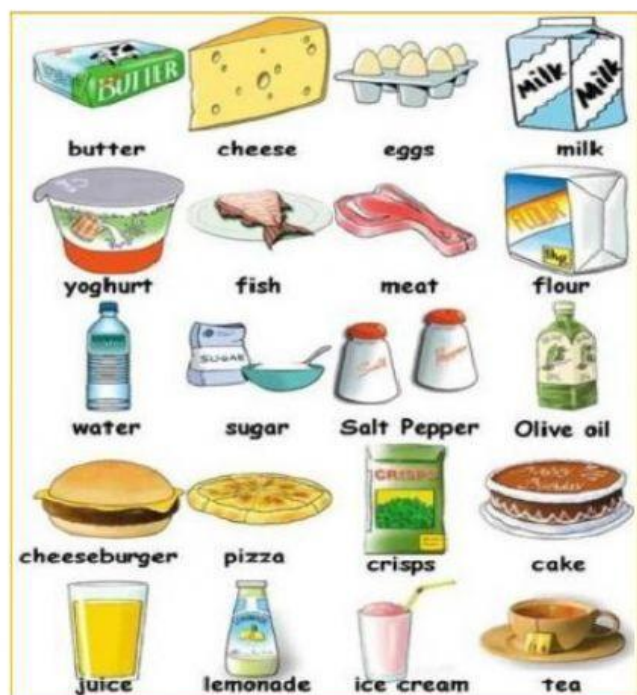

COUNTABLE / UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

COUNTABLE NOUNS

- **Nouns** you can count.
- You can use *a / an* before them.
- **Nouns** that have a plural form.

UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

- **Nouns** you can't count
- Normally, you can't use *a / an* before them.
- **Nouns** that normally don't have a plural form
- We can make UNCOUNTABLE nouns COUNTABLE using a unit or a quantity with "OF"
e.g.: a bar of chocolate

HOW MUCH... / HOW MANY...

- used to ask about the quantity of something.
 - How much + **uncountable nouns**
e.g.: How much ham do you need for the recipe?
 - How many + **COUNTABLE** :
e.g.: How many potatoes and sausages?

QUANTIFIERS

A quantifier is a word or phrase used to talk about quantities, amounts or degree. They can be used with a noun (as a determiner) or without a noun (as a pronoun).

e.g.: Is there any cheese? (any as a determiner)

Yes, there's a little. (a little as a pronoun)

some + plural countable nouns or uncountable singular forms.

- It has an affirmative meaning.
- It can be used in questions when expressing offer or request.

e.g.: Do you have **some** time to help me?

Sure. I have **some** minutes after lunch.

any + plural countable nouns or uncountable singular forms.

- it is used for indefinite quantities in questions and negative sentences.
- We use any to mean 'it does not matter which or what', to describe something which is not limited. We use this meaning of any with all types of nouns and usually in affirmative sentences.

e.g.: Call me for **any** information about the courses.

We could choose **any** colours we wanted.

much + uncountable noun

used to express a large quantity

e.g.: I haven't got **much** change.

many + plural nouns

e.g.: Are there **many** campsites near you?

a lot of / lots of + uncountable or plural nouns

- it is more usual in affirmative sentences
- more informal

e.g.: We've got **lots of** things to do.

That's **a lot of** money.

a little + uncountable nouns

- used to express a small quantity
- it has a positive meaning

e.g.: She saves **a little** money every month.

little + uncountable nouns

- used to express a small quantity
- it has a negative meaning

e.g.: There is **little** information, I'm afraid.

a few + plural nouns

- used to express a small quantity
- it has a positive meaning

e.g.: she wants only **a few** moments on her own.

few + uncountable nouns

- used to express a small quantity
- it has a negative meaning

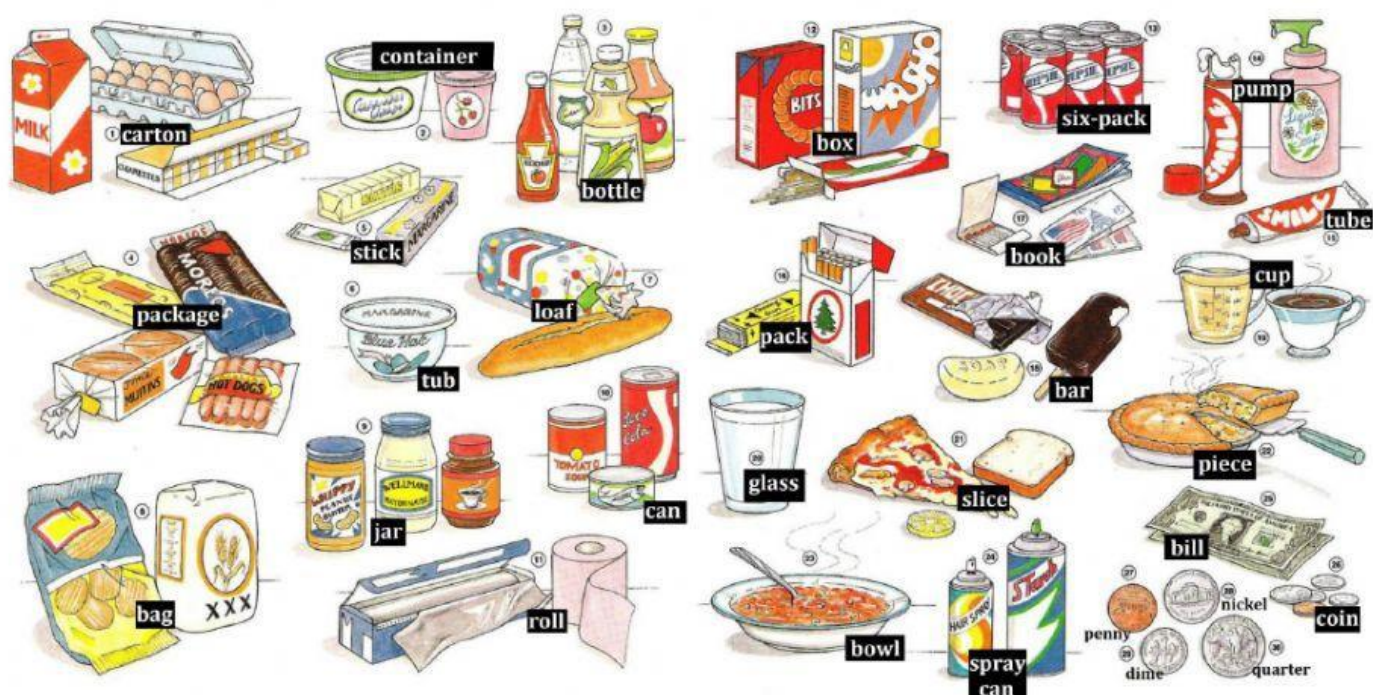
e.g.: She has only **few** moments on her own, that's why she is always so tired.

no + zero quantity (no = not any)

- We use **no** directly before nouns
- **None** is the pronoun form of **no**.

e.g.: She says she has **no** friends.
