





YET - until now. Use it in negatives and questions:

ALREADY - usually means earlier than expected, before the present moment. You can use it in affirmatives and questions but not usually in negatives:

1. I have **already** done my homework.
2. Have you **done** your homework **already**?
3. I haven't **already** done my homework.
