Long-Distance Footpaths

Otis is thrilled, excited, elated even and, most of all, proud. He has good reason to be. He and his friends, Bill and Jeff, have just completed 3,500 kilometres of rough hiking along the Appalachian Trail in the US. They have walked the length of the Appalachian mountain (56)_____ through fourteen states, starting in Georgia in the south and finishing in Maine in the north.

Their trip spanned the time between leaving high school in April and starting college in late September. On the way, they stayed in mountain (57)_____ and, once in a while, friends and family would meet them when the trail crossed a highway, bringing fresh supplies and plenty of encouragement. 'I'm really pleased we managed it,' says Otis. 'It's something special we can tell our grandchildren! We had a few (58)_____ experiences, like the time we met a bear and another time when we disturbed a rattlesnake, but they (59)_____ bother you unless you frighten them and so, most of the time, it was just wonderfully peaceful.'

Otis and his friends were able to enjoy the solitude of the mountains thanks to Benton MacKaye, whose vision led to the creation of the trail in 1923. One, which dates from the Middle Ages and which now serves both a recreational and a religious purpose, is the 'Camino de Santiago de Compostela', in northern Spain.
