

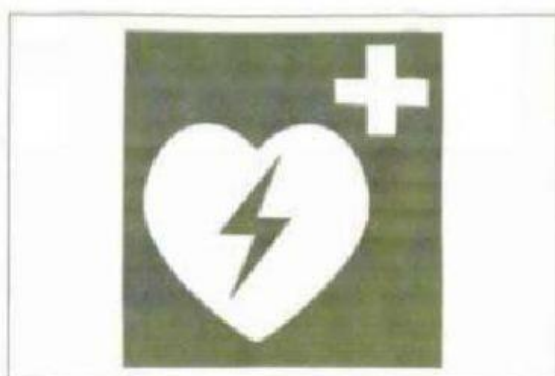

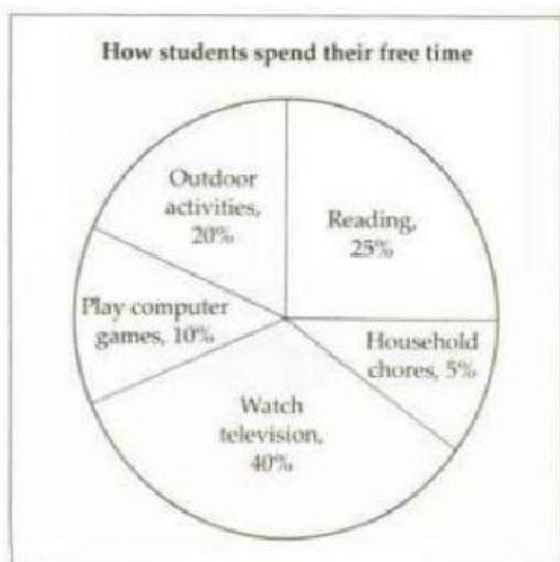

KUALA SELANGOR: The Health Ministry has directed district health officials to monitor schools, where the influenza A virus outbreak has been detected. Dr Adham Baba said influenza infection detected in several schools is still under control and no school closure order has been made so far.

In the meantime, Education Minister Dr Mohd Radzi said to date, only two classes at SJKC Li Hwa Butterworth, Penang, had been closed after five pupils were diagnosed with influenza A.

Influenza is an infection with flu symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough, headache, muscle and joint pain, and fatigue. The virus can lead to severe infections in high-risk groups such as children, the elderly, pregnant women and those with chronic illnesses.

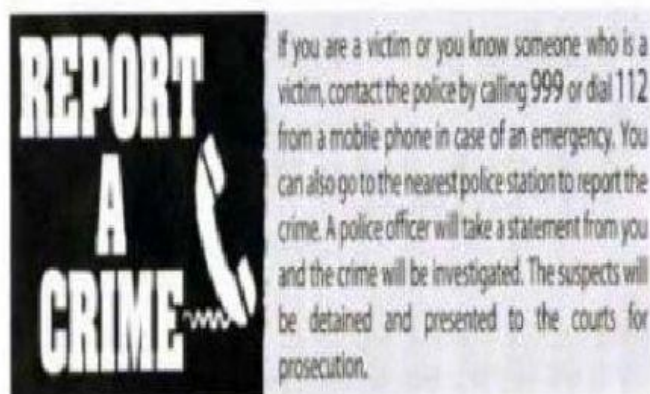

Tracy and her husband had just moved to their new luxurious home in the autumn of 2009. It might seem like **her life was perfect and filled with much joy**. They had a vivacious four-year-old daughter named Katie, a grouchy Siamese cat, and an infant son. However, this little bundle of joy, Kevin, had a health condition which is still a mystery.

Kevin had been born hypotonic which basically means he had an abdominal hernia, a heart murmur, strange folds on his ears and a V-shaped birthmark in the centre of his forehead. It was disheartening for Tracy to see her son placed under intensive care. The geneticist knew that the condition of Tracy's son was a genetic disorder but he could not place it.

After weeks of care in the hospital, he was healthy enough to go home. However, he remained undersized and underweight, hardly able to hold up his head. Amid the busy routine of feeding and rushing Katie to school, Tracy realised that her baby was a little quiet and weak for his age. They often wondered whether he was aware of his surroundings.

In December, they were called to a small room at the Alberta Children's Hospital where Dr Ivan explained that a piece of their son's genetic coding simply was not there. He handed them a pamphlet which provided them some explanation of his condition that is renamed Kleefstra Syndrome. Kevin had developmental problems because every single cell in his body would be duplicated even with the tiniest wounds. However, because of the limited cases of this disease, the pamphlet could only provide anecdotes rather than a prognosis. A patient of this disease would likely face obstacles in speech, mobility and learning. These can be overcome if he is lucky.

One evening, as the family was having dinner, Katie suddenly jumped from her seat and skipped to her brother in his highchair. She set herself behind Kevin, hands clutching either side of his chair, and started flinging herself from one side of his head to the other. Then, she looked at him and said,

"Hello, Mr Cutie-cute!" Unexpectedly, his face erupted into a grin. He gave a sudden, gurgling exuberant laugh. "It was then that we realised this boy could feel joy and we had to find him," said Tracy.

A new chapter began in their lives. There were monthly visits to an overworked early intervention clinic that recommended rudimentary physical therapy such as exercises to encourage rolling over and sitting up. The workout seemed too much for Kevin. Tracy pushed the therapists for better ways to address Kevin's disorder. Fortunately, they were persistent. Otherwise, their son's therapy would have started at the age of three at the earliest.

Tracy was determined not to give up. Using her background as a research editor and radio producer, she continued to look further. She would read any book on disability and the brain that she could get hold on. With knowledge from one of the books, her father helped her build a crawling track in their living room. The track, which was a ramp with low sides made of heavy plywood, was propped at an angle so that it would help her son to move.

After attending a programme for a week, Tracy returned home and reorganised the main floor of their house for their son's therapy. They filled their living room with mats and flashcards with words and dots for counting. Tracy was responsible for running her son's therapy programme. Every day, she and her husband would be holding up flash cards containing words, numbers or sentences. Apart from this, their son's diet too had to be monitored. He had to eat food free from allergies and inflammatories to eliminate any possible nutritional impediments to his development.

All of Tracy's efforts were worth it. By the time Kevin was seven, the family was no longer doubtful that he had the ability to learn. He could tell his name and address, draw a picture, and even spell the words. Though a year behind schedule, he went to kindergarten in a normal school.

Students Amidst the Covid-19 Pandemic
