

Main idea and supporting details

In a paragraph, the sentences tell about one **theme** or main idea. In many cases, this is stated in a **topic sentence**. All of the sentences that tell more about the main idea are called **supporting details**.

Example

Read the following paragraph.

At the Conch Cracking Contest in Grand Bahama, we ate conch cooked in many different ways. At breakfast, we had a hot bowl of stewed conch with potato bread. Later in the day, we enjoyed some delicious conch salad. The best dish of all was a tender cracked conch served with crab and rice.



The main idea of the paragraph is:

At the Conch Cracking Contest in Grand Bahama, we ate conch cooked in many different ways.

The **supporting details** are all of the sentences that tell about eating conch cooked in different ways. These are:

- At breakfast, we had a hot bowl of stewed conch with potato bread.
- Later in the day, we enjoyed some delicious conch salad.
- The best dish of all was the tender cracked conch served with crab and rice.

The diagram below shows this in another way.
