

VERB TO BE

The ***verb to be*** is used to say something about a person, thing, or state, to show a permanent or temporary quality, characteristic, state, job or occupation, age and nationality. Look at the examples.

- ❖ Sarah is 34 years old.
- ❖ My classroom is not enormous.
- ❖ We are happy.
- ❖ It is cold outside.
- ❖ Are you an engineer?

Verb "to be": Present

Pronoun	Affirmative	Negative
I	I am - I'm	I am not - I'm not
you	you are - you're	you are not - you aren't
he	he is - he's	he is not - he isn't
she	she is - she's	she is not - she isn't
it	it is - it's	it is not - it isn't
we	we are - we're	we are not - we aren't
they	they are - they're	they are not - they aren't
you	you are - you're	you are not - you aren't
