### TO + V AND THE -ING FORM

We use to + infinitive after:		
some verbs	choose, help, hope, learn, need, offer, want, decide	<i>I <b>hope to go</b> to university next year.</i> <i>He <b>wants to help</b> me.</i> <i>I'm <b>learning to speak</b> Italian.</i>
adjectives	happy, difficult, etc.	<i>They were <b>happy to see</b> me.</i> <i>This exercise isn't <b>difficult to do</b>.</i> <i>She was <b>surprised to hear</b> I was ill.</i>
would like, etc.	would like / (don't) like / enjoy / love / hate	<i>We'd <b>like to come</b> and see you later.</i>

We use the -ing form after:		
some verbs	enjoy, finish, mind, miss, keep	<i>I <b>enjoy watching</b> all sports.</i> <i>We <b>finished doing</b> our homework.</i> <i>I <b>miss seeing</b> my friends.</i>
prepositions	for, of, about	<i>Thanks <b>for helping</b> me.</i>
