Fighting the Floodwaters

The city of New Orleans has always had a problem with flooding. The city's location is part of the reason. New Orleans lies between two great bodies of water, the Mississippi River on the south and Lake Pontchartrain on the north. When the Mississippi River rises from heavy rainfall to the north, the extra water naturally tries to spread out into the city. There is danger to the city from the river during heavy rains. Hurricanes traveling along the Gulf Coast also bring a threat of flooding in the city. Another reason New Orleans often has water problems is that the city itself is like a saucer in a way. Its edges are higher than its middle. The middle dips below sea level. When a hurricane hits or when the river floods, there is always a chance that the city will fill with water. The Orleans Levee Board was created to address the problem of flooding. The Levee Board taxes citizens and uses the money to build high banks along the river called levees and floodwalls. Over the years, millions of dollars have been spent on hurricane and flood protection. Today the city is safeguarded by a complex system of levees, floodwalls, and floodgates. The longest of the levees and floodwalls are along the Mississippi River and Lake Pontchartrain.

Conch Cracking Festival



Each October, McLean's Town, on Grand Bahama Island is the place to be in The Bahamas. This is where the annual Conch Cracking festival is held in historic McLean's Town. Each year, the festival brings to the Island of Grand Bahama a fun-filled and entertaining day of friendly competition for the entire family. Visitors from Grand Bahama, other Family Islands, Canada, and the United States attend the festival.

At the festival participates and spectators hear and dance to live Bahamian music. They experience and taste traditional Bahamian food and beverages. The popular dishes made from conch are always available. These include conch fritter, conch salad, conch and rice, gilled conch, stew conch, cracked conch, curried conch, and jerk conch.

There is always entertainment for the entire family. Children can go in the bouncing castle and participate in other games for kids. For the adults, there is sculling, kayaking, the plaiting of the maypole, bird watching and much more! There are also traditional games and other family-friendly fun including; the egg and spoon race and climbing the greasy pole. Visitors are never left out at Conch Cracking. The festival has been in existence for forty-one years. It was the brain child of English teacher, Jeffery Morgan who recognized the unique conch extracting skills of the students of the McLean's Town All-age School. He turned it into a competition, and it became the main attraction of the school's annual fair. Since 1972 to present, the festival has remained constant; however, it evolved into a major community development and tourist-friendly event.

However, the highlight of Conch Cracking is the competitive traditions of seeking to **determine** the fastest conch-crackers in the world. There are various conch cracking events with categories for tourists and novices, corporate groups, males and females competition remain a main event.
