How do we form the Present Perfect Simple?

	I	Have ('ve)	
Affirmative	He / She / It	Has ('s)	Finished / left
	You / We / They	Have ('ve)	
Negative	I	have not (haven't)	
	He / She / It	has not (hasn't)	Finished / left
Interrogative	Have	I	
	Has	He / She / It	Finished / left?
	Have	You / We / They	

How do we form the Present Perfect Continuous?

	I	Have ('ve)	
Affirmative	He / She / It	Has ('s)	Been studying.
	You / We / They	Have ('ve)	
Negative	I	have not (haven't)	
	He / She / It	has not (hasn't)	Been studying.
Interrogative	Have	I	
	Has	He / She / It	Been studying?
	Have	You / We / They	

PRESENT PERFECT SIMPLE OR CONTINUOUS?

We use the Present Perfect Simple :	We use the Present Perfect Continuous :
<ul style="list-style-type: none">For an action which <u>has just finished</u>. <p>They have just made a deal</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">For an action which started in the <u>past</u> and continues up to the <u>present</u>. <p>Mr Davis has been teaching for six years. (he began working as a teacher 6 years ago and he still is)</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none">To put emphasis on NUMBER <p>He has painted twenty pictures</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">To put emphasis on the DURATION of an action. <p>She has been painting this picture for two hours. (She started 2 hours ago and she is still painting it)</p>

 We use the Present Perfect Simple instead of the Present Perfect Continuous with non-continuous verbs. (Know, believe, like, etc.)

E.g. I've known Sharon since we were at school together. (NOT: I've been knowing Sharon since we were at school together)

 With the verbs **LIVE**, **FEEL**, and **WORK** we can use both Present Perfect Simple and Present Perfect Continuous with **NO DIFFERENCE** in meaning.

E.g. He **has been living** / **has lived** here since 1994.
