

Indefinite Pronouns

We use Indefinite Pronouns (adverbs) to talk about people, things or places.

People	Things	Places
Somebody	Something	Somewhere
Everybody	Everything	Everywhere
Anybody	Anything	Anywhere
Nobody	Nothing	Nowhere

- We use "some" words and "every" words in positive sentences.
- We use "any" words in negative sentences and questions.
- If an indefinite pronoun (Somebody, Everybody, Anybody or Nobody) is the subject of the sentence, it is singular.
- When we use *nobody* or *nothing*, we use an affirmative verb.
