

UNIT 4 — comparative review and (not) as ... as

Function

We use comparatives to compare one thing, person, or place to another thing, person, or place. We use *as ... as* to show that two things are equal. We use *(not) as ... as* to show that two things are not equal.

Form

Adjectives with one syllable My sister is quieter than I am. Silvia is nicer than Ella.	Adjectives that end with -y and have two syllables Horacio is happier than Frank. I'm lazier than my sister is.
Adjectives with two or more syllables Cities are more expensive than small towns. He is more handsome than his father. Now I'm more ambitious than I was then.	Irregular forms He's a better cook than his sister is. New York is farther from her than Chicago is.
as ... as She's as friendly as her daughter. He's as tall as I am. I'm as stressed as you are about this.	(not) as ... as I'm not as creative as you are. They're not as hard-working as we are. She's not as optimistic as she used to be.
