



Tigers are the largest felines in the world. Many cultures consider the tiger to be a symbol of strength and courage. However, because hunting them is also a sign of bravery in some cultures, tigers are endangered; no more than 3,200 tigers are left in the wild.

Tigers have distinctive stripes, which help camouflage them when hunting prey. Some tigers have orange fur with black stripes; others are black with tan stripes, white with tan stripes or all white (albino). On average, tigers are 1.5 to 2.9 m long and weigh around 75 to 325 kilograms. The largest tigers, the Siberian, also called Amur, are 3.3 meters long and weigh 300 kg. The smallest tiger is the Sumatran tiger. They grow to 1.5 to 3.7 m and weigh around 65 to 305 kg. Tigers also have very long tails, which can add 0.7 to 1.1 m to their overall length.
