Topic: Serving Others

Please read the passage below as well as The Children's Bible in 365 Stories: "The Call of Moses" (p. 62) "The New Leader" (p. 91) "Deborah and Barak" (p. 103) before answering the questions.

In St. Mark Chapter 9 verse 35 Jesus stated, "Whosoever wants to be first must be the servant of all." A good leader should therefore seek to serve others. A servant leader is one who exhibits humility, cares for others and leads by example. In St. John 13:3-5, Jesus exhibited servant leadership by washing His disciples' feet.

There are many Old Testament leaders who served with excellence. Three such leaders were Moses, Joshua and Deborah. Moses was known for his humility, Joshua for his courage and Deborah for her wisdom. They were successful leaders who found favor with God.

Children can serve as good leaders by exhibiting characteristics such as respect, dependability, courtesy, reliability and honesty. They should be examples for their peers. They should also be willing to share their skills and resources with others.



God Calls Moses

EXODUS 3—4

Many years passed while Moses cared for the flocks of Jethro, his father-in-law.

One day the sheep and goats were cropping the grass on the lower slopes of Mount Sinai. Moses looked up and saw a bush that seemed to be on fire. He watched anxiously, in case the fire should spread through the dry, desert land. But, although the fire glowed bright, the bush stayed unharmed. Curious, Moses went nearer, to look more closely.

Then he heard a voice coming from the heart of the fire. Moses knew at once that it was God's voice.

'Take off your shoes, Moses,' God said. 'For this is holy ground.'

JOSHUA 1

JUDGES 4—5

After the death of left-handed Ehud the Israelites once again forgot about God and his laws.

Trouble soon came from King Jabin in the north of the country. His army was equipped with nine hundred iron chariots and led by General Sisera. Israel's lightly armed soldiers stood no chance against these swift, strong chariots and for twenty years King Jabin treated Israel with great cruelty and violence.

The leader of Israel at this time was a woman called Deborah. She used to sit under one particular palm-tree, so that everyone knew where to come for help or advice.

One day Deborah sent for a man called Barak.

'Barak,' she began, 'God has said that you are to get an army together to fight against Sisera. In spite of his chariots, God will help you win.'

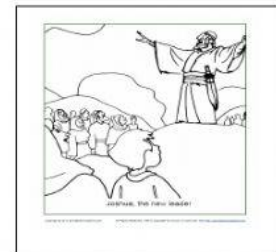
