

REWRITE SENTENCES BY USING FORMAL SUBJECT "IT"

English sentences must have a subject (except for imperative sentences). So, if we don't have any other subject, we can use 'there' or 'it'.

This is sometimes called a "formal subject"/ 'dummy subject' or an 'empty subject'.

A. TYPE 1: **Formal Subject IT used with adj**

V-ing/ To-V + be + adj → It +be+adj+to-V.

(**adj**: hard, difficult, foolish, silly, easy, necessary, (im)possible, good, nice, essential, important, advisable, right, wrong...)

Ex: Stealing is wrong./ To steal is wrong.

→ It is wrong to steal.

B. TYPE 2: **Formal Subject IT used with Noun**

V-ing/ To-V + be + a/an/the/_/my + N .

→ It +be+ a/an/the/_/my + N +to-V.

(**nouns**: pleasure/shame/duty/wish/fun/honor...)

Ex: Meeting you is an/my honor.

→ It is an/my honor to meet you.

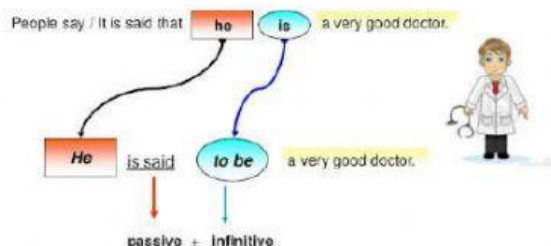
C. TYPE 3: **Passive voice with "It is said that = People say that"**

(**Verbs**: say/ know/believe/think/ rumour/report..)

Ex: People say that this piece has been written by that musician.

= This piece is said to have been written by that musician.

→ It is said that this piece has been written by that musician.

D. TYPE 4 : "It takes sb + time+ to-V." = I spend time+ (on) + V-ing.

Ex: I spent 2 hours on cooking dinner.

- It took me 2 hours to cook dinner.
