New research suggests that using smiley face emojis in work e-mails could put your career in danger. Researchers from a university in Israel report that people inserting emojis in work-related mail might be considered stupid and incompetent. **A.**_____ The professionals had to "evaluate both the competence and warmth" of the e-mail writer. Dr Ella Glikson said: "In formal business e-mails, a smiley is not a real smile." She added: "Our findings give us first-time evidence that smileys do not increase perceptions of warmth and actually decrease perceptions of competence."

Other research has also shown that emojis are often misunderstood. Some of this misunderstanding is related to how the reader or viewer interprets the emoji design. **B.**_____ The emoji that was typed in by the writer is not shown in the same way in the e-mail received and read by the reader. This happens when the writer and reader of an e-mail do not use the same software or operating system for their devices.
