

Objects of Prepositions

Prepositions usually answer the questions where or when. They tell the location of someone or something in relation to time and space. Prepositions should not be the last word in a sentence. They should always have a direct object.

<u>Prepositions of Place</u>					
in	on	under	next to	between	near

<u>Prepositions of Movement</u>					
down	up	out of	into	toward	away
past	over	onto	off	around	under
<u>Prepositions of Time</u>					
before	after	at	until	on (day)	at (time)
in (month)	in (season)	around	through		

The **object** of a preposition is after the preposition in the sentence.

Examples:

The cat hid under **the bed**.

The girl walked around **the kitchen**.

My brother is at school until **3:00**.
