1. The United States is divided ____ 50 states. However, each state varies in size considerably. The smallest state is Rhode Island ____ an area of just 1,545 square miles (4,002 sq km). By contrast, the largest state ____ area is Alaska with 663,268 square miles (1,717,854 sq km).



2. Alaska has the longest coastline in the United States at 6,640 miles (10,686 km).
3. Bristlecone pine trees, believed ____ be some of the world's oldest living things, are found in the western United States in California, Utah, Nevada, Colorado, New Mexico, and Arizona. ____ oldest of these trees is in California. The oldest living tree itself is found in Sweden.



4. The only royal palace used by a monarch in the U.S. is located in Honolulu, Hawaii. It is the [Iolani Palace](#) and belonged ____ the monarchs King Kalakaua and Queen Lili'uokalani until the monarchy was overthrown in 1893. The building then served

_____ the capitol building until Hawaii became a state in 1959. Today, the Iolani Palace is a museum.

-70 degrees (-56°C).
- The _____ temperature recorded in the United States (and in North America) **HOT**
was in [Death Valley](#), California on July 10, 1913. The temperature that day measured
134 degrees (56°C).
- The _____ lake in the U.S. is Oregon's [Crater Lake](#). At 1,932 feet (589 m) **DEEP**
it is the world's seventh deepest lake. Crater Lake was formed via
snowmelt and _____ that gathered in a crater created when **PRECIPITATE**
an ancient volcano, Mount Mazama, erupted about 8,000 years ago.
