

How to use 'JUST'

We use 'just' to express that something happened '*a short time ago*' or '*very recently*'.



*This is how we use 'just'
correctly in a sentence:*



Just means 'a short time ago'.

We use 'just' with the present perfect and past perfect tenses (*have been, had been, etc.*).

We put 'just' between the **auxiliary verb** and the **main verb**.



I'd (I had) **just seen** him in the corridor.

He's (he has) **just been** to Spain for his holidays.

I'd (I had) **just finished** dinner when he came.

In American English, 'just' is used with the past simple tense. Example:

I **just saw** him.

He **just finished** writing a book.
