

Compound Sentences with **And, But, Or, and So**

- An **independent clause** is a group of words with at least one subject and one main verb and forms a complete thought.

Independent clause: **Alex** **likes** **chocolate.**
subject verb object

- A **compound sentence** combines two or more independent clauses with connecting words (**and, but, or, so**).

Everyone was busy, **so** **I went to the movie alone.**
independent clause connecting word independent clause

- A comma separates the clauses, but short two-clause sentence with **and** may not need a comma (especially if the subject of the two clauses is the same).

Compound Sentences with And, But, Or, and So		
and	And adds information and connects similar ideas.	Alex likes chocolate. + He eats it every day. = Alex likes chocolate, and he eats it every day.
but	But shows contrast and connects opposing ideas.	She has blonde hair. + Her sister has brown hair. = She has blonde hair, but her sister has brown hair.
or	Or expresses an alternative or choice.	Do you want soup? + Do you want a salad? = Do you want soup, or do you want a salad?
so	So introduces a result.	Everyone was busy. + I went to the movie alone. = Everyone was busy, so I went to the movie alone.
