Listening Strategy

Some words are stressed in a sentence. A stressed word is sometimes said more slowly and clearly than the other words around them. Stressed words are helpful because they let you know that this is important information. Sometimes, listening to the stressed words can help you get the meaning of a sentence.

A cultural exchange is when people from around the world meet to learn about other cultures.

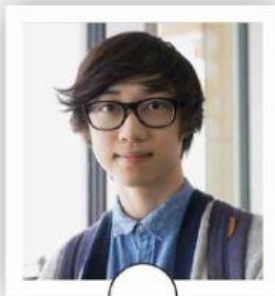

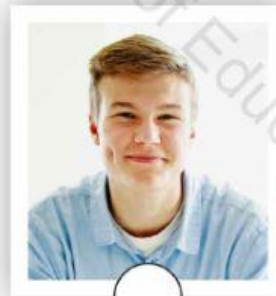
