

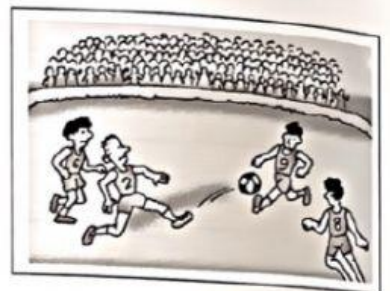
QUANTIFIERS

A **quantifier** is a word or phrase that is used before a noun to indicate quantity or amount.

- (i) '**Many**', '**several**', '**a few**' and '**a large number of**' are **quantifiers** used before countable nouns.

Examples:

1. There are **many** spectators in the stadium.



2. **Several** passengers were injured in the accident.



3. Only **a few** pupils in the class passed the test.



4. Mr Owen has **a large number of** ostriches on his farm.



- (ii) '**Much**', '**a little**' and '**a large amount of**' are **quantifiers** used before uncountable nouns.

Examples:

1. The coffee is too sweet. There is too **much** sugar in it.



2. I just need **a little** extra time to finish my work.



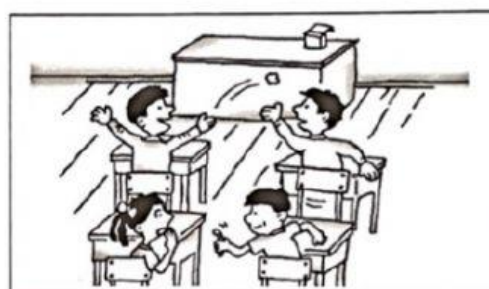
3. Mr Lee spent **a large amount of** money to renovate his house.



- (iii) '**Some**', '**any**', '**plenty of**' and '**a lot of**' are **quantifiers** used before countable and uncountable nouns.

Examples:

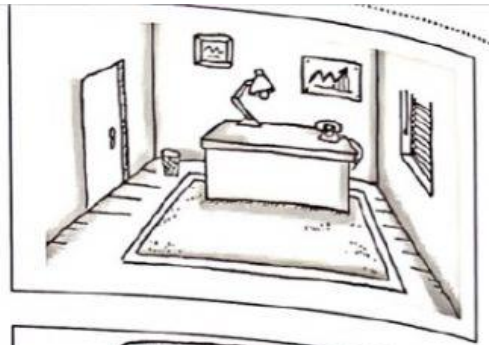
1. **Some** pupils were very noisy.



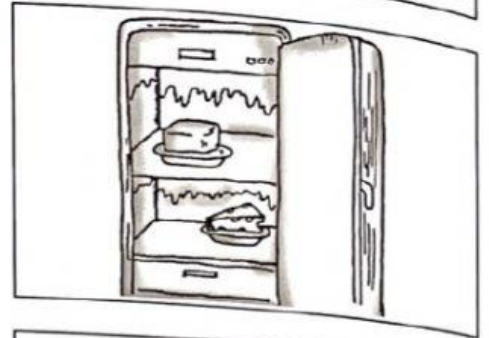
2. I gave the beggar **some** food.



3. There aren't **any** people in the office.



4. Is there **any** butter in the fridge?



5. There are **plenty of** tickets for the show.



6. Peter puts **plenty of** jam on his bread.



7. There are **a lot of** mosquitoes in this forested area.



8. The children had **a lot of** fun at the party.



More examples:

1. How **many** patients are there in the ward?
2. My brother has **many** friends.
3. Mr Smith can speak **several** languages.
4. The magician has taught me **a few** tricks.
5. There are **a few** birds on the tree.
6. There is **a large number of** birds in the bird park.
