Language tip

More quantifiers

a couple of
a dozen / half a dozen
a few
a number of
A couple of means 'two'.
Half a dozen means 'six'.
A dozen means 'twelve'.
Two dozen means 'twenty-four'.
Notice that you say: *a dozen eggs / half a dozen eggs*
NOT
a dozen of eggs / half a dozen of eggs
You say: *two dozen eggs*
NOT
two dozens eggs
A few means 'a small number of'.
