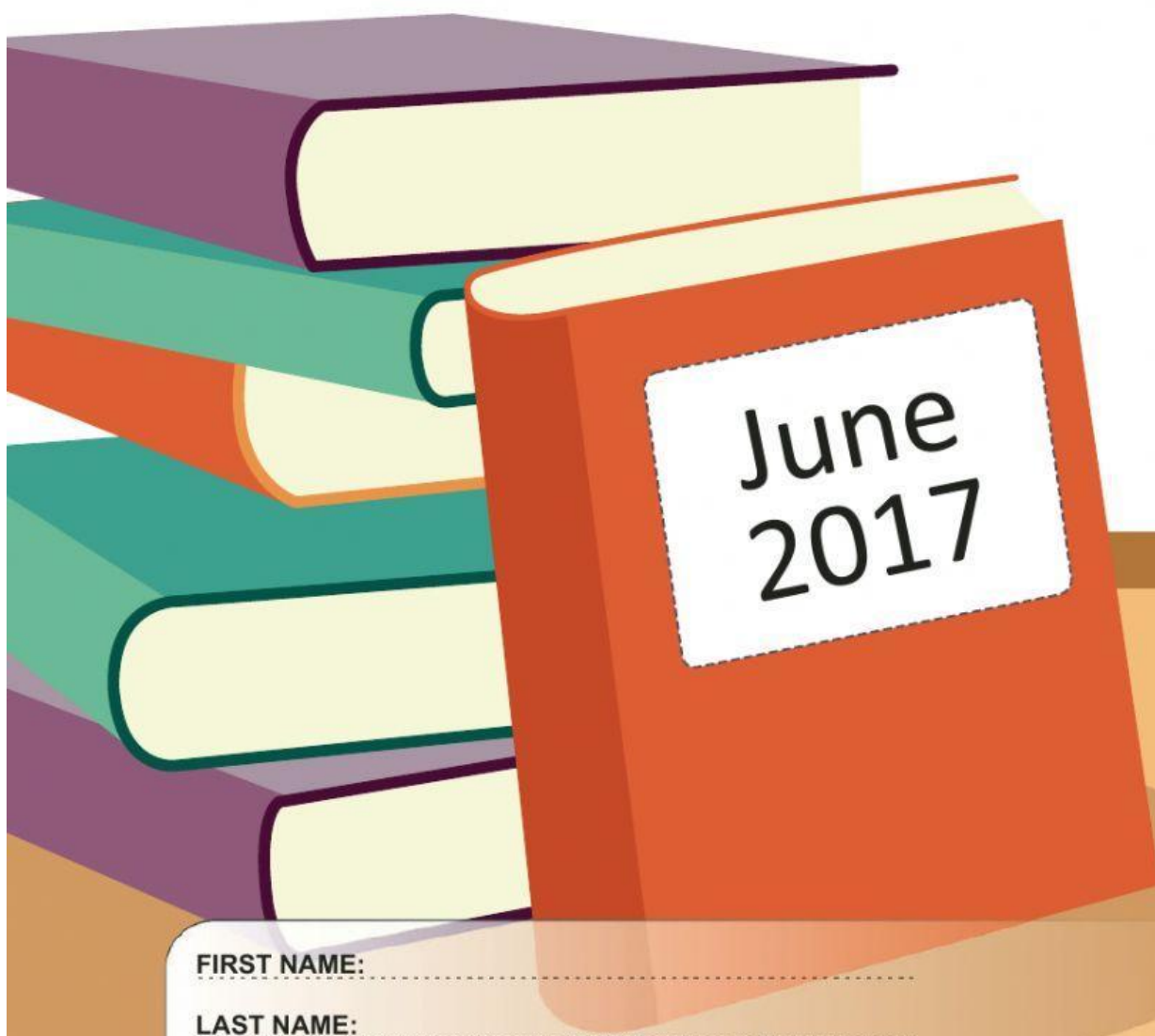

Read the following passage about *Everest* and then do the exercises on the next page.

Climbing Mount Everest

At 8,848 metres, Mount Everest in Nepal is the highest mountain in the world. It attracts climbers from all over the world. It is not known if people in ancient times climbed it. What we know is that in 1921, British climbers tried to get to the top of Everest. However, a terrible storm did not allow them to go higher than 7,000 metres. In 1922, a second group of British climbers climbed as high as 8,326 metres. In 1924, a third group of British climbers went higher than ever before. However, during this climb, one climber, George Mallory, died a few hundred metres from the top.

After 1924, climbers from Britain and other parts of the world tried to reach the top of Everest, but they were all unsuccessful. In 1952, some climbers from Switzerland, together with Tenzing Norgay, an internationally famous climber from Nepal, made a new climbing record; they managed to go up to 8,600 metres, which was very close to the top.

Finally, on May 29, 1953, Tenzing Norgay and Edmund Hillary from New Zealand finally reached the top. Most of the members of the climbing team were British. James Morris, a British journalist, was with some of the climbers at a camp on the mountain. When he heard the news, he sent a runner to a nearby village in Nepal. From there, a message of the British success was sent to London.

Nowadays, although the cost to climb Mount Everest has become extremely high, the number of climbers has increased. More than 1,000 people try to make it to the top every year. With the help of better climbing equipment and modern technology, climbing Everest has become easier. However, this dangerous mountain has claimed the lives of 250 people.

The Role of Horses in Human Life

At first, horses were wild animals. The first horses appeared in North America about 3.5 million years ago. About 10,000 years ago, the horses in North America disappeared completely. Nobody really knows why. All modern horses come from the wild horses that lived in Central Asia. Modern horses are much bigger than ancient horses, but like ancient horses, they enjoy eating grass, apples and carrots.

For thousands of years, people in Central Asia hunted horses. They used their meat for food and their skin to make clothes. About 4,500 ago, the Sumerians started using horses to carry both people and things from one place to another. When people began to leave Central Asia, their horses helped them to fight in wars.

When the Spanish arrived in North America in the 16th century, they brought the horse back to its homeland. The American Indians had never seen horses before and their arrival completely changed their way of life. Before the coming of the horse, the Indians used dogs for carrying small things. But horses were more useful because they could carry heavier things than dogs could. Hunting also changed. Before the horse, the Indians hunted on foot. After the arrival of the horse, they became excellent horse-riders and hunted animals from horseback.

Nowadays, although some people still use horses for transport and farming, the horse is mainly used for pleasure.

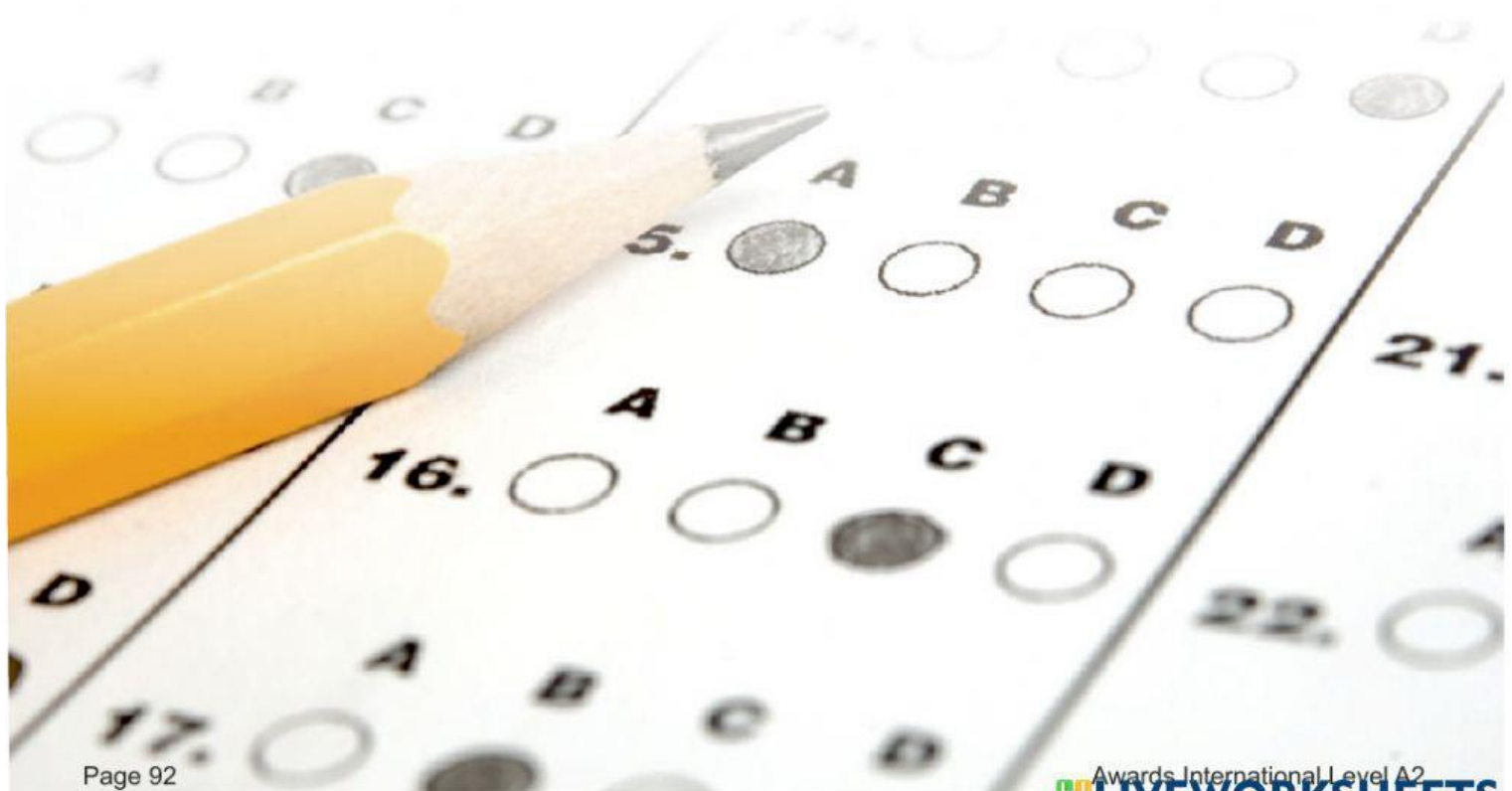
