When writing a description of a place, we often give examples to support our statements. We use words and expressions like: such as, for example and like for the presentation of examples.

England has got famous castles like / such as Windsor Castle.

I like team sports, for example, football and basketball.

Antonio Gaudí designed unusual building such as / like the Casa Milà.

You can use them interchangeably, but: 'for example' is between commas.
