

Must/mustn't/not have to

• We use **must** to talk about rules (like **have to**) and to talk about what we feel obliged to do.

My room is a mess. I must tidy it.

- We use **mustn't** to talk about things we must not do.
You mustn't walk on the grass.
- We use **not have to** to talk about things we don't have to do.
You don't have to wear a uniform.
