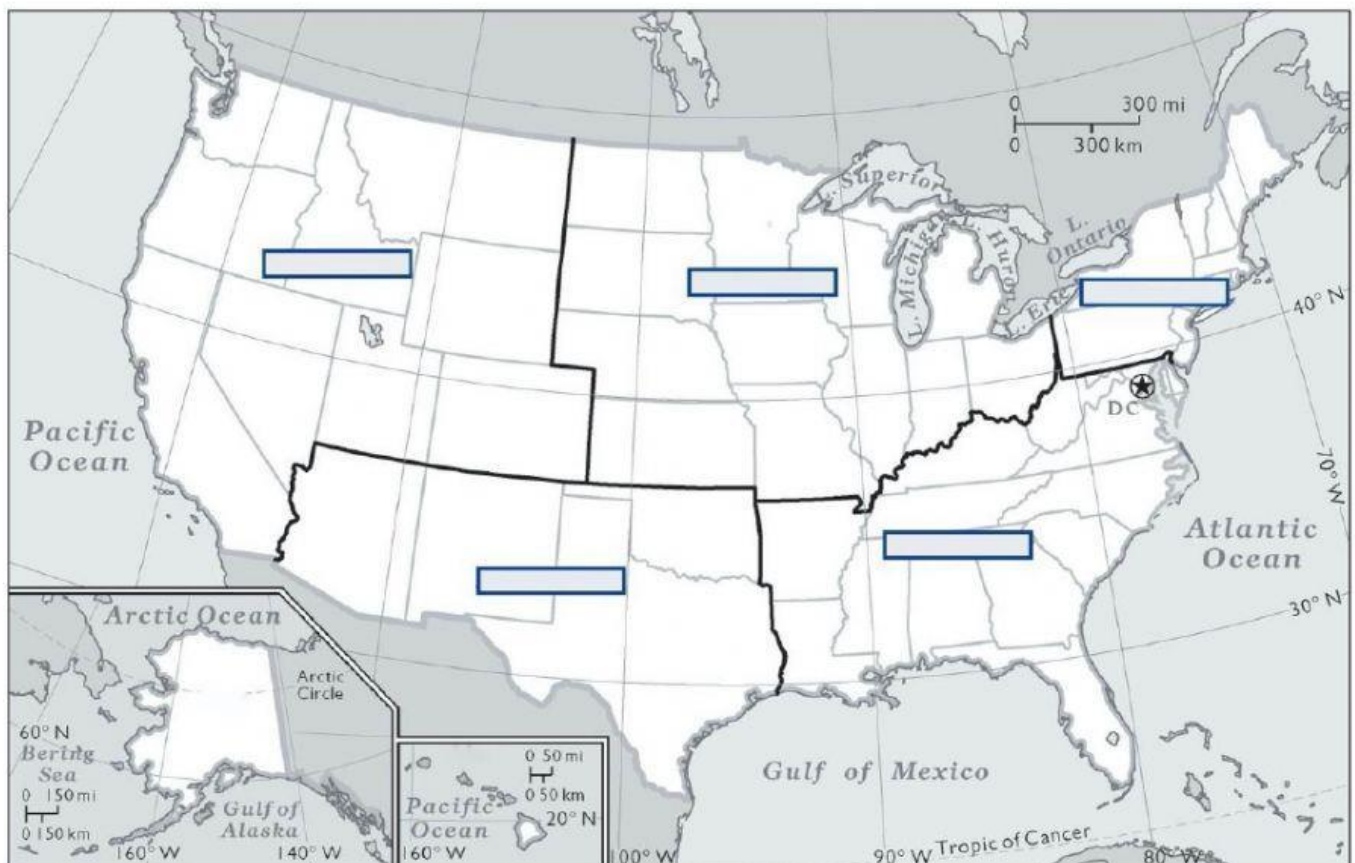

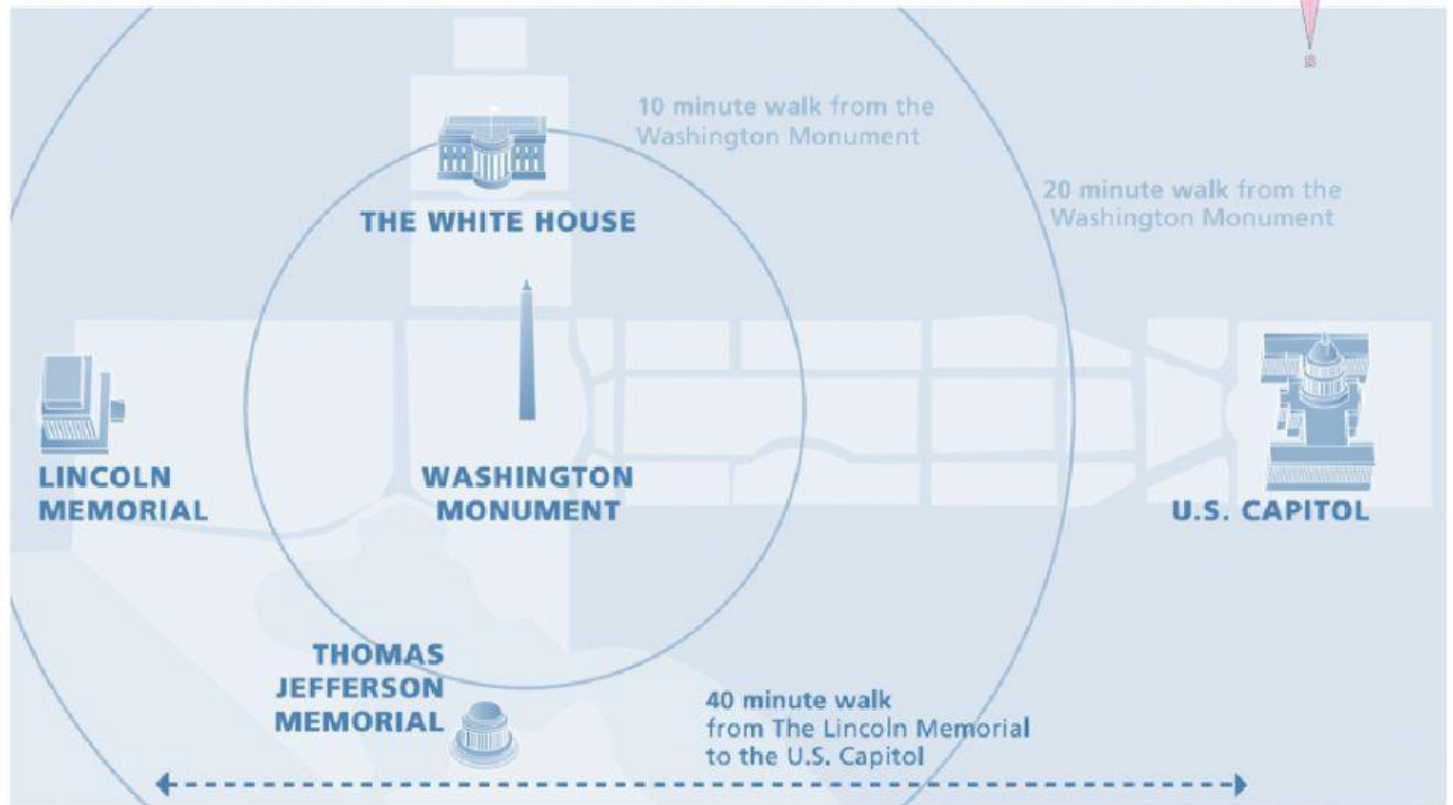
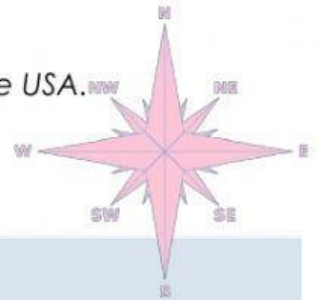
A place is in the north, south, west, east of a country, state, city etc.

9. Adjectif + participe passé (-ed/3ème colonne)

He likes wearing old-fashioned clothes.
