CHARITY SHOPS FOR ALL

One thing that is tricky to find in charity shops is good handbags. I'm sure the shop staff grab them as soon as they arrive! [4] That's so annoying, when you can't get the right size.

For me, I have noticed that as the charity shops get bigger, they start to get more organised and start looking like normal shops. As a result, more people go in. [5] In fact, I have now noticed that the prices are slowly going up too, which is not great, especially for less well-off people who can't afford the prices of clothes in normal shops.'
