However, they realized they had to provide special protection for children. <u>In 1989, many members of the United Nations signed the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC). But all over the world, there are other children who don't have those rights. They have to grow up too early. Some have to leave school to earn money for their families. Others have to get married because the family cannot feed and clothe them.

These are some of the special rights all children have, according to the CRC:

- The right to a safe and healthy life
- The right to education
- The right to protection from harmful work
- The right to a family
- The right to protection during war
- The right to express their opinions
- The right to equal treatment

Children who have access to food, clean water, health care and education have a better chance at a good life. They will be able to find jobs when they are older.
