

The Past Progressive

The past progressive (or past continuous) tense is used to talk about actions or events that were in progress at some time in the past. It is formed with "was" or "were" and the present participle (-ing form of the verb).

Examples:

At 8:00 this morning,

I **was eating** breakfast.
Josh **was walking** his dog.
The cat **was playing** with its toys.
You **were doing** yoga.
The neighbors **were sleeping**.
